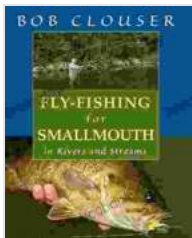

Reel

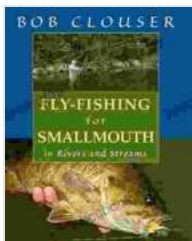

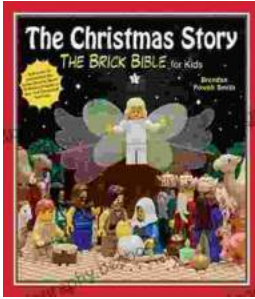
